The first complete computational map of shared words in Sri Guru Granth Sahib Ji —
34 voices, five centuries, 17,086 exact echoes, every one verifiable at its Ang

PURPOSE OF THIS STUDY

Sri Guru Granth Sahib Ji carries the bani of the Guru Sahiban together with the Bhagats, the Bhattas and Gursikhs — voices spanning roughly five centuries and thousands of miles. Scholars have long described individual dialogues among them. This study computes, for the first time, **every exact phrase shared between different writers** across the whole Granth, and presents the result as a verifiable dataset and an interactive constellation at aigurbaniresearch.com.

The method is stated openly, was validated against the five canonical echo pairs cited in scholarship (all five rediscovered blind), and draws no interpretive, chronological, or theological conclusions. Every echo can be checked directly at its Ang.

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The Study in Simple Words

What did this study do? Sri Guru Granth Sahib Ji holds the bani of the Guru Sahiban alongside saints of many communities and centuries — a Sufi of Pakpattan, a weaver of Banaras, a cobbler, a barber, a farmer, a king, court poets. For the first time, a computer compared every line of the Granth with every other line and found each place where two *different* writers use exactly the same words. It found 17,086 such shared phrases — we call them **echoes** — joining 32 of the 34 writers into one web.

An example anyone can check. At Ang 1384, Sheikh Farid Ji sings: ਤਨੁ ਨ ਤਪਾਇ ਤਨੂਰ ਜਿਉ ਬਾਲਣੁ ਰਡ ਨ ਬਾਲਿ — "Do not torment your body like an oven; do not burn your bones like firewood." At Ang 1411, Guru Nanak Dev Sahib Ji sings the very same nine words. Two voices, centuries apart, one breath. The Granth holds thousands of such meetings — and now every one of them is mapped.

How do we know the method works? Before trusting it, we tested it. Scholars have long pointed to five famous places where a Guru Sahib and Sheikh Farid Ji share words. The computer, without being told about any of them, found all five on its own. Only after it passed that test did we accept everything else it found.

What does it show? On aigurbaniresearch.com the result is drawn as a constellation: every writer a star, every shared phrase a thread. Tap any star to see its bonds; tap a bond and the actual lines open side by side, with translations. The strongest bridge between the Gurus and the Bhagats is Bhagat Kabir Ji with Guru Arjan Dev Sahib Ji — 422 echoes.

Why it matters. Because it shows, in numbers anyone can verify, what the Granth has always taught: that truth is *sanjha* — shared. Voices of different faiths, castes and centuries speak the same words, and the Granth binds them into one book. This study simply makes that oneness visible, thread by thread.

Words used in this report. **Ang** — a page of Sri Guru Granth Sahib Ji (there are 1,430). **Shabad** — a hymn. **Bhagat** — a saint whose bani is enshrined in the Granth. **Echo** — two lines by different writers sharing the same run of words. **Bond** — all the echoes between one pair of writers, taken together. The remaining sections give the full method and tables for readers who want every detail.

From the 60,555 lines of Sri Guru Granth Sahib Ji (ShabadOS open database v4.8.7), all 55,439 content lines by 34 writers were normalised and compared for exactly shared word sequences. The analysis found **17,086 echo pairs** — pairs of lines by two different writers sharing an exact phrase of four or more consecutive words (or an exceptionally rare three-word phrase) — forming **127 bonds** among **32 of the 34 writers**. Of these, **1,621 echoes join a Guru Sahib with a Bhagat**, 6,793 echoes span 500 or more Angs, and 23 echo pairs sit on the very same Ang — text placed side by side in the compilation itself. The longest exact echoes run ten words. Before any new claim was trusted, the method had to rediscover, unaided, the five canonical Guru-Bhagat echoes long cited in scholarship; all five were found (Section 5).

This is, to the best of our knowledge after a survey of the published literature, the first complete computer-made map of the shared words inside Sri Guru Granth Sahib Ji. Existing scholarship on the Granth's internal relationships is rich but qualitative; existing digital platforms are readers and search tools. Neither computes the web of shared words. The full dataset accompanies this report.

2 · The corpus

Source: the ShabadOS open database v4.8.7 of Sri Guru Granth Sahib Ji — all 1,430 Angs, 60,555 lines, Unicode Gurmukhi, with line-level writer attribution. Only content lines enter the analysis: **55,439** lines typed Pankti (verse) or Rahau (refrain). Excluded, so that structural repetition is never mistaken for shared speech: Sirlekh headers (4,403 lines), Manglacharan invocations (568), and Raag Mala (62 lines, Angs 1429–30), which is an index of raags rather than discourse. Attribution follows the source database throughout (its conventions are noted in Section 6).

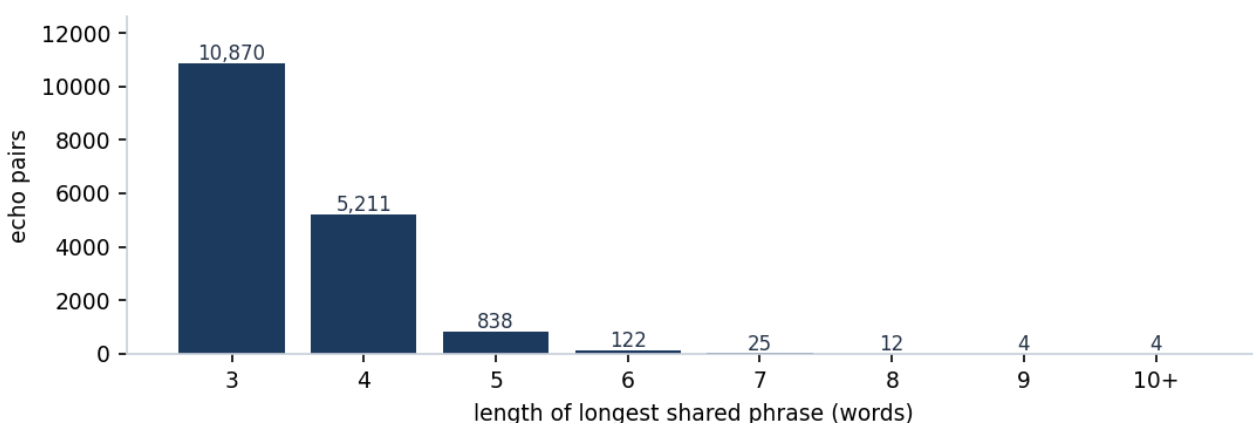
3 · Method — exact matching, stated openly

Normalisation. From each line: dandas (॥), vishraam punctuation, digits and the structural marker ਰਹਾਉ (ਦੂਜਾ) are removed. Nothing else changes — no stemming, no spelling folding, no diacritic stripping. Every remaining word must match exactly as written.

Matching. Candidate alignments are seeded by shared word 4-grams occurring in at most 60 lines (and by rare 3-grams occurring in at most 6 lines), then every alignment is extended left and right to the **longest possible** exactly-shared phrase for that pair of lines. An **echo pair** is two lines by different writers whose maximal shared phrase is ≥ 4 words, or exactly 3 words when that phrase occurs in at most 6 lines of the whole Granth. Frequent short phrases are reported separately as the **shared tongue** (Section 7), never as echoes.

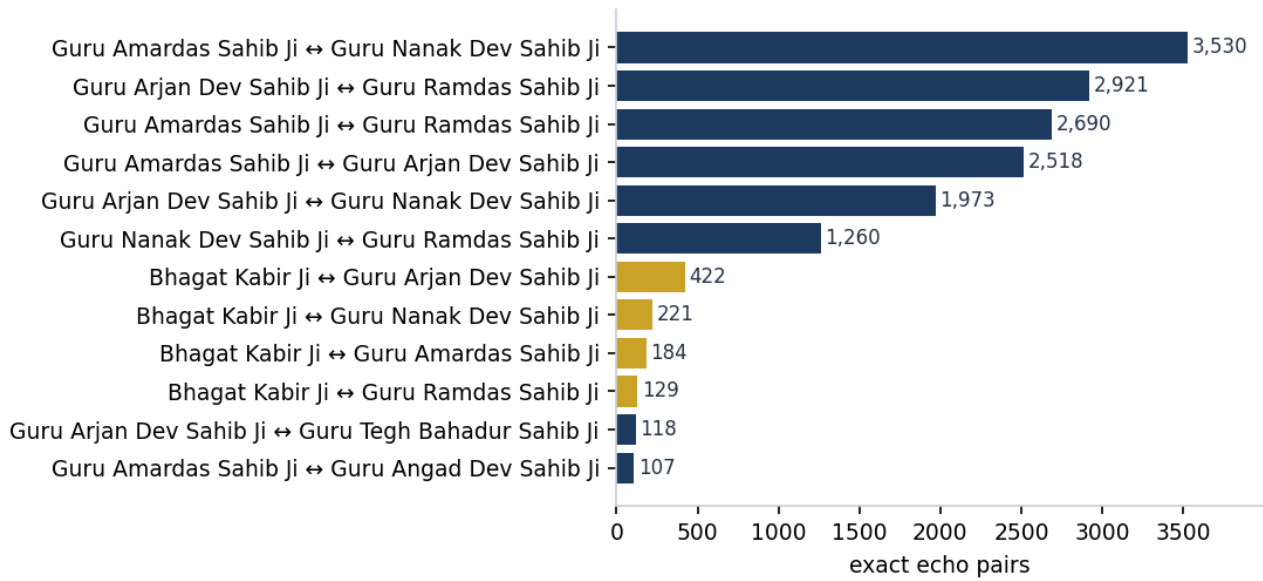
Scoring. Each echo pair is scored L^2 , where L is the length in words of the longest shared phrase; a bond between two writers is the sum of its pair scores. Tiers: **strong** (≥ 6 words, 167 pairs), **notable** (5 words, 838), **echo** (4 words, 5,211), **rare signature** (rare 3-word, 10,870).

What the method cannot see. Because matching is exact, thematic call-and-response in different words is not counted. The famous salok of Guru Amar Das Sahib Ji answering Sheikh Farid Ji about the black and white hair (Ang 1378) shares its subject but not four consecutive words — so it is absent here by design. This map is therefore a **floor, not a ceiling**, of the conversation inside the Granth. A semantic (meaning-level) extension is future work.



4 · The strongest bonds

The heaviest bonds join the Guru Sahiban to one another — one shared house of language across the successors of Guru Nanak Dev Sahib Ji. The strongest bond crossing into the Bhagats is **Bhagat Kabir Ji ↔ Guru Arjan Dev Sahib Ji** (422 echoes), followed by Bhagat Kabir Ji with Guru Nanak Dev Sahib Ji (221). Gold bars mark bonds that include a Bhagat.



5 · Validation — the known echoes, rediscovered blind

A method that claims to find unknown echoes must first find the known ones without being told. The five canonical Guru-Bhagat echo pairs cited in scholarship were all rediscovered by the algorithm on its own:

Token-level signatures confirm the same picture: the signature ਫਰੀਦ appears in lines attributed to Guru Arjan Dev Sahib Ji 10 times and Guru Amar Das Sahib Ji once; ਕਬੀਰ appears in lines of Guru Arjan Dev Sahib Ji 8 times — the Gurus speaking in the Bhagats' own signatures.

6 · Findings — the longest and farthest echoes

The fourteen longest exact echoes in the Granth (by shared words, ties by Ang distance):

Attribution note. Writer attribution follows the ShabadOS database at line level. Its conventions include, for example, the shabad headed ਸਾਰੰਗ ਮਹਲਾ ੫ ਸੂਰਦਾਸ (Ang 1253) being grouped under Bhagat Surdas Ji although the header itself names Mahalla 5 — the dialogue is encoded in the header. Such cases are preserved as the database records them and are visible in the dataset.

The smallest voices are in the web too. Bhagat Jaidev Ji — 4 echoes with 3 partners; Bhagat Sadhna Ji — 5 echoes with 3 partners; Bhagat Pipa Ji — 8 echoes with 5 partners; Bhagat Ramanand Ji — 4 echoes with 3 partners; Bhagat Sain Ji — 1 echo with 1 partner; Satta and Balwand — 31 echoes with 5 partners; Baba Sundar — 26 echoes with 4 partners. Only Bhagat Parmanand Ji (10 lines) and Bhatt Bhalh (4 lines) — the two smallest corpora — show no exact cross-writer phrase, stated openly.

Beyond one-to-one echoes, some phrases belong to everyone. 126 three-word phrases occur in at least 12 lines by at least 4 writers; the twenty most widely shared:
